Use a question mark to indicate where you're confused or with a question Take notes in the margins

Draw arrows to make connections to other ideas and information

- 3. Find an event in the story so far that was interesting or exciting.
- 4. Write 2 or 3 paragraphs about this event from the point-of-view of a news reporter, an investigative reporter, a book reviewer or one of the characters in the story.


- 5. Read your point-of-view aloud to a peer or peers in a small group.
- 6. Answer the following questions:
  - a. Did anyone mention the same details?
  - b. What evidence was used to support the details or information used in your point-of-view description? Give some examples.
  - c. How did the evidence used support your ideas?
